Feedback on the e-ITEC course on Competition Law by Representative from the Competition Commission of Brunei Darussalam

In Brunei, competition law is a technical and relatively new concept that requires pro-active and open advocacy efforts over time to build up the competition culture and promote competition. - 4) Each country's legislative and legal framework needs to be reviewed accordingly to make it more relevant and meet the needs of the 21st century.
- 5) Competition authorities should ramp up and increase cooperation regionally and internationally. This can be by having workshops and capacity building between countries or providing technical assistance to competition authorities that needs it.

Overall, this programme has enriched us with the necessary knowledge and broaden our perspective on various aspects of competition. We therefore would like to thank the organizing team from National Law University Jodhpur, India for organizing and facilitating the program. We truly appreciate what we learnt and gained in this program both academically and for self-development.
